Cure drug addicts, stop crime says John Howard Association

When you stop drug addiction you are stopping crime by the back door, according to Andrew Lyons, program director of the John Howard Association.

Lyons was speaking on "Alcoholism and Drug Addiction" at the annual membership meeting of the Kapiolani Hospital Auxiliary last week at the Outrigger Club.

He told the concerned and vitally interested group of women that you cannot actually separate alcoholism from drug addiction because alcohol is a drug. He described the work his organization, whose main aim is rehabilitation, is doing with

heroin addicts.

The John Howard Association, located in the Richard Street YWCA, is an Aloha United Fund Agency that works to rehabilitate offenders and ex-offenders; delinquents and pre-delinquents.

"And that," Lyons pointed out, "takes in just about everybody."

HEROIN ADDICTS

He told of the work his organization has been doing with a group of some 31 heroin addicts who are "on the street" (not in institutions or hospitals). The group is racially mixed, their age variation wide.

Part of the program to rehabilitate them involved

sending them to the State Hospital to go through withdrawal, get their health and energy back, find a job and make a fresh start.

"We failed almost completely," Lyons said.

In telling of this group of about 31 addicts he pointed out that they were using about \$455,000 worth of heroin a year. Which means they are stealing from \$1 million to \$1 1/2 million worth of merchandise a year. If these addicts could be cured Ala Moana Shopping Center would have about \$1 million less thefts in a year.

He spoke of his deep frustration and of his

search for knowledge about heroin addiction. He found the highest percent of cures were accomplished at the Federal Hospitals at Ft. Worth, Texas and Lexington, Kentucky. And they were curing barely five percent of the addicts who came to them.

Further research brought the discovery of a husband and wife team in New York. They were using methadone, which itself is a drug, and they were curing 88 percent of the addicts they worked with.

Lyons said his program has two aims: to stop persons from taking heroin and to stop persons from committing crimes.

METHADONE

With methadone he can accomplish this. But because it is a drug it has not been too easy to get

his program in action. He likened it to the diabetic, who must use insulin to keep his diabetes under control.

He is about to start a methadone program here, with two hospitals ready to implement the program. He is awaiting funding and admits he is not entirely certain where the funds are to come from.

Asked about marijuana, he described it and LSD not as drugs but as hallucinogens. He said it is not addictive but may be habituating. It saps motivation; the young people who use it don't want to go to school or out surfing. They don't care if they don't date.

He pointed out that another unfortunate facet of young people using these hallucinogens and drugs is that they must go to criminal sources to obtain them.
