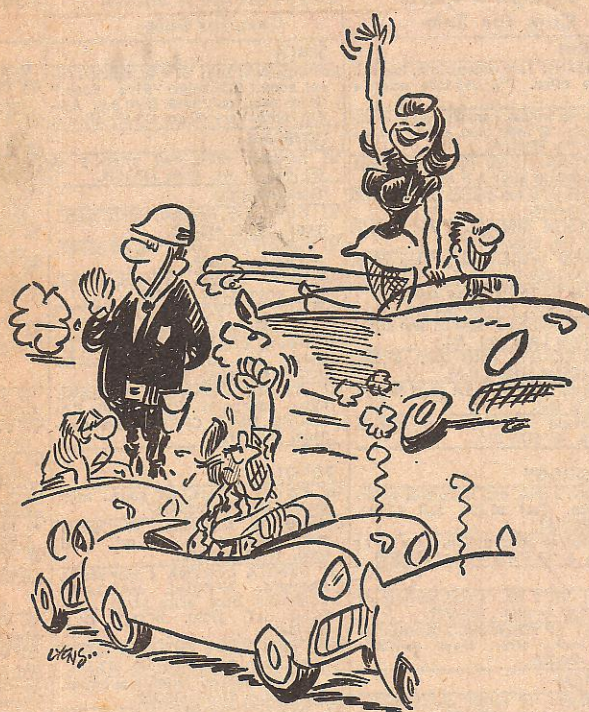

## Sportsman Johnny Hollinger Dies

John J. "Johnny" Hollinger, longtime Waikiki water sportsman, died Sunday at the Queen's Medical Center. He was 74.

Mr. Hollinger, who lived at 6157 Makaniolu Place, last month was awarded the Outrigger Canoe Club's Winged O award as one of the organization's most outstanding members. He was a charter member of the club.

Friends may call from 6 to

9 p.m. Thursday and from 8 to 9:30 a.m. Friday at Williams Mortuary. The Rosary

will be recited at 8 p.m. Thursday. Requiem Mass will be celebrated at 10 a.m. Friday at Holy Trinity Church, followed by burial at Hawaiian Memorial Park.

Mr. Hollinger is survived by his wife, Lucille; a daughter, Mrs. Winona Hollinger Slate; two sisters, Mrs. Julia Dunn and Mrs. Ellen Whitney; four brothers, Edward, Henry, Richard and Frederick Hollinger, and two granddaughters.

Mr. Hollinger was born July 25, 1894, in Honolulu. He was a blacksmith with the first Hawaiian Infantry during World War I. In 1949 he retired after 27 years as a machinist with the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard.

Mr. Hollinger coached several rowing clubs and won medals for swimming, canoe paddling and surfing. He also was an outstanding soccer player. He was a member of the Healan Rowing Club and the Hawaiian Rowing Association.
