The trophy was put up in 1943 by the Matson Navigation Co. in memory of Walter J. Macfarlane, who was president of the OCC in the late 1930's and early 1940's.

TODAY'S. REGATTA will be held in front of the Moana-Surfrider Hotel in Waikiki. The course extends seaward through the surf for a half mile and returns to the finish at the beach. The first race is at 10 a.m.

The Senior Men's race will be over 21/2 miles. Waikiki Surf Club, Hui Nalu, Healani and Lanikai loom as the chief threats.

There will be 13 races under the auspices of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association.
