# Volleyball

## Rainbows win own invitational

There may be strength in numbers, but the University of Hawaii men's volleyball team found plenty of power in a chosen few last night, winning the second annual Rainbow Invitational tournament men's title, 16-14, 15-7, over Outrigger Canoe Club.

Aloha Volleyball Club, an off-season club team for the UH Wahines, won the women's championship with a 17-19, 15-9, 15-12 victory over the Poi Pounders — a team of Wahine alumni. The tournament, on the UH campus, began Friday with 24 teams in pool play.

The Rainbow men were down to eight players last night. Starting outside hitter Ray Price is out for the season with an injured ankle. Another starter, John Hanley, and freshman Brian Costales were sick.

But what was left played the best volleyball of the season for Hawaii, which is 5-3 in the California Intercollegiate Volleyball Association.

"After Ray got hurt, and John and Brian went out, it seemed we started playing much more like a team," outside hitter Jaime Plummer explained. "We didn't make the mental mistakes all of a sudden. And once we got rid of those, everything else fell into place."

Whether the change came from natural causes or was just a matter of necessity, Plummer wasn't sure. But whatever it was, Outrigger — one of the top U.S. Volleyball Association teams in the country — couldn't stop what it produced.

At the start of the match, it looked like Hawaii would take the same licking it has taken every time the two teams have played this season in exhibition matches. UH was down 12-5 as Ken Morrow, Mike Cote and Jon Anderson controlled the net.

But UH assistant coach Reede Reynolds called timeout at 12-5 and after the break things were never the same.

Outrigger didn't score until a line violation on UH moved it ahead by 13-11. Anderson served another point on a UH error for 14-11 but put his next serve into the net. Brad Pierce and Plummer pulled Hawaii into a tie at 14-all and the Bows won the match on two Outrigger errors.

"I think all Reede told us was to keep the ball in play," Plummer recalled about the timeout. Those must have been the magic words. UH kept the ball in play on its side with some outstanding defense. And it put the ball down on the other side with strong hitting and clever setting — and a few clutch blocks.

Plummer, a left-handed outside hitter, and sophomore Jim Kalaukoa, who jumps far above most blocks, did most of the damage. And middle blocker Pierce played well enough to be named all-tournament, along with Kalaukoa.

The Poi Pounders were just a few distractions away from defeating Aloha VBC. With UH alumni Joyce Kaapuni (formerly Kapuaala), Diane Sebastian and Cheryl Grimm and Waipahu grad Mary Corales hitting and blocking well and Lani Hayes

setting, the Pounders eked out a 19-17 first game victory. But that was taken every by some controversial calls, especially on Kaapuni's sets.

When the controversy continued, the Poi Pounders lost some of their enthusiasm. And the Aloha VBC seemed to pick it up.

Deitre Collins, Kori Pulaski and Marcie Wurts began connecting at the net, with Kris Pulaski setting. As the Poi Pounders' passing faltered, Aloha got even stronger and found some emotion it didn't have at the beginning of the match.
