Shoji Named Pan Am Sportsman of the Year

It was Volleyball Night at the Honolulu Quarterback Club Banquet of Champions at the Queen Kapiolani Hotel as the sport walked off with the following top honors:

—Dave Shoji, who coached the University of Hawaii Rainbow Wahines to two consecutive NCAA championships, was named the Pan American Sportsman of the Year. He received two around-the-world tickets from the airline.

—Deitre Collins, UH's All-American and winner of the Broderick Cup as the nation's top woman collegiate athlete, won the Female Athlete of the Year award.

—And, Sharon Peterson, coach of the NAIA-championship UH-Hilo women's team, captured the Neal S. Blaisdell Award for her advancement of local sports. She was recently named coach at the University of Kentucky. Shoji, whose team went 34-2

this season, credited his players for the award.

"The coach is really made by the players... They earned this award for me. I couldn't do it alone," said Shoji, who thought the award went a long way in giving recognition to the sport of volleyball.

Henry Ayau Jr. won the Scotty Schuman Award for his contribution to amateur and water sports, while QB Club President Moroni Medeiros awarded special citations to Norman Aweau, Augie Dias and Gary Shimabuku for their contributions to youngsters in the community.

Other winners: Reydan "Tita" Ahuna of Kamehameha, female prep athlete of the year; Sean Kinilau of St. Louis, male prep athlete of the year; Raphael Cherry of the University of Hawaii, male athlete of the year; Margaret Lee, a masters runner, senior athlete of the year. Hedemann 3rd in Surfing

Hawaiian professional surfer Hans Hedemann continues to cling tenaciously to third place as the world surfing circuit heads for a finish in Australia.

The Association of Surfing Professionals world championship for 1983 is still very much in doubt, as Hedemann and Australians Rabbit Bartholomew and Tom Carroll are in fierce competition for that honor.

Hedemann took third place in the Stubbies Surfing Classic at Burleigh Heads in Queensland, which ended March 18. Hedemann was in good company as fellow Hawaiians Derek Ho, Vince Klyne, Byron Wong, Denton Miyamura and Mike

Latronic made it to the first round of the 48-man competition.

MAKAHA'S BIRD Mahelona provided some of the greatest excitement of the contest with his barrel rolls in the 2- to 4-foot waves, according to Hedemann. Swarms of sharks sighted in the contest area also helped maintain excitement.

Bartholomew and Carroll traded the

lead in the world ratings as a result of the Stubbies, with Carroll taking first place and Bartholomew second. The Surfabout, the richest contest in surfing, has been canceled this year, which leaves the Beaufortaires for Tyres and Bells Beach Easter Open to determine who will be the top surfer in this inaugural year of the ASP.

Rosa an Olympic Hopeful

His chances are one in three. He's already "over the hill" at 37. And he only has eight months experience in flat-water kayak racing.

So it's no wonder Hawaii Kai's Marshall Rosa is "a little nervous" as he prepared to leave today for the U.S. Olympic kayak trials at Lorton, Va. Rosa is one of two Hawaii kayakers vying for a spot on the eight-man team for the Summer Games in Los Angeles, July 28-Aug. 12.

The trials will be held April 11-14 and Rosa said he wanted to arrive at the race site early to get used to the weather, the waters of Ocoquan River and get adjusted to the time difference. Bob Twogood of Kaneohe has a jump on Rosa. He's been at the site 17

miles south of Washington, D.C., for the past two months.

"I'm getting a little nervous," the Outrigger Canoe Club paddler said last night. "Most of the paddlers are in their 20s. Only three of us are old men (in their 30s)."

Rosa and Twogood, 31, will be two of 24 paddlers competing for eight spots on the K-1 team, one-man kayaks which are 17-feet long and weigh 26 pounds. Rosa, a carpenter who also builds kayak-type surf skis locally, will be using a K-1 built in Denmark.

The kayakers will compete at two distances—500 and 1,000 meters. Rosa did most of his sprint training on the Ala Wai Canal while Twogood practiced on the Kawaiuni Canal in Kailua.

Volleyball at UH gyms

The University of Hawaii men's volleyball team, hoping for a long-shot berth in the California Intercollegiate Volleyball Association playoffs, will play host to the Rainbow Volleyball Invitational tomorrow night and Saturday.

The Rainbows, 7-9 in CIVA play, have two league matches remaining against Stanford April 18 and 20 at Klum Gym. If UH wins both, it still needs help from the teams ahead of it to make the playoffs April 27-28 at Cal State-Northridge.

The CIVA champion has an automatic Final Four bid. The next four teams play for a second berth. UCLA (11-0), Pepperdine (11-4) and USC (9-4) have clinched spots in the top five.

Competing for the last two spots are Long Beach State (9-6), San Diego State (8-6), UC-Santa Barbara (7-6) and Hawaii. The 49ers have three matches remaining, the Aztecs four and the Gauchos five.

The Rainbows split matches with SDSU and UCSB and lost twice to Long Beach. But tomorrow and Saturday at the UH campus, Hawaii returns to local-style volleyball.

Beginning at 6 p.m. tomorrow the women's bracket of the Rainbows Invitational begins with continuous round-robin play. Competing are UH Green, UH White, Na Wahine 'U, Team Diet Pepsi, Na Kama Ha'o, Brigham Young-Hawaii, Kuipoos, Ka Wahine O Ke Kai, Daughters and Kamehameha Volleyball Club.

Men's play opens Saturday at 9 a.m. with Hawaii, Outrigger Canoe Club (AA), OCC Masters, BYUH, Lanikai, T.A.Z., High Five, Lokahi, Na Kama Ha'o, Hilo Masters, Polynesians and UH Masters competing.

The women's playoffs begin Saturday night at 6 with the men following at ap-

proximately 7:30. There is no admission charge.

U.S.-Japan Volleyball

One team is seeking its first Olympic medal ever, the other is trying to regain the form that earned the gold in Munich 12 years ago. Together, the two will provide some of the most exciting volleyball Hawaii has seen when the U.S. men's national team takes on the Japan Nationals in a pre-Olympic exhibition match Tuesday night at Blaisdell Arena.

"This should be the best volleyball Hawaii has ever seen," said "Magnum, P.I." star Tom Selleck, honorary men's team captain. "I hope everyone who enjoys volleyball will come and see this."

Selleck will be on the U.S. bench when the Michelob Light Friendship Cup Tour match begins at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$5 and \$8, with proceeds going to the U.S. team.

THE U.S. HAS NOT qualified for the Olympics since a seventh-place finish at the 1968 Games in Mexico City with a team that featured Hawaii's Pete Velasco and

Tom Haines. Japan steadily improved its standing from a bronze at the '64 Games in Tokyo, to silver in Mexico City and then the gold in Munich. The Japanese were fourth in Montreal.

Though the United States, as the host country, automatically gained a berth for the Los Angeles competition, its team is considered one of the top powers in the world. In a strong showing at the Pan American Games last August, the U.S. lost the bronze medal to Argentina in three straight games.

This is the last American stop for the tour, which finished a two-match series in Santa Barbara Tuesday night, then continued on to Long Beach for matches tomorrow and Saturday.

The lone Hawaiian associated with the U.S. team is assistant coach Tony Crabb, who has played for Punahou School, Church College of Hawaii (now Brigham Young-Hawaii) and Outrigger Canoe Club.—By Cindy Luis.

Volleyball teams remember when

UH White gains Rainbow title

There are no more NCAA championships available, but some volleyball players aren't ready to break out their rocking chairs yet.

In the women's final of the Rainbow Volleyball Invitational at Klum Gym last night, the University of Hawaii White team defeated the UH Greens, 15-12, 15-4.

The Whites were the seven seniors off the two-time defending NCAA championship team. The Greens were their former teammates, led by juniors Lisa Strand and Lee Ann Pestana.

In the men's final, the Outrigger Canoe Club's AA team—composed of former Hawaii high school players who have returned from college—defeated UH, 15-13, 15-12.

Both teams reached the final after getting past pool play. The 10-team women's bracket played for five hours Friday night. The 12 men's teams went for seven hours yesterday prior to the championship.

Clearly, this wasn't the NCAA final. U.S. Volleyball Association tournaments, especially in Hawaii, are low key and informal. This was no exception.

UH middle blockers Steve Sebastian and Bill Via played a little 2-on-2 basketball during warm-ups.

Kelly Knowles, a transfer who will play for the Wahines in the fall, umpired the men's final, pulling her hood over her face when someone questioned a close call.

UH men's assistant coach Diane Sebastian was called out of the stands to coach in the final because head coach Dave Shoji was announcing. She went up to her start-ers and gave them all a high five. Enough coaching.

The UH White team might have enjoyed itself more than anyone. It held on to win the first game, then breezed through the second game before struggling in an exhibition third game.

"It was kind of funny walking in," Marcie Wurts of the White team said. "All of us were on this side and they were over here. It was weird. . . . We took the attitude that we can't let them beat us. We had fun. I don't think they had quite as much fun."

The OCC team—especially Jon Anderson, Elgin Calles and Marc Haine—was a little more than the Rainbows could handle.

The UH first team rallied to a 13-all tie in the first game, but it blocked two serves into the net to help OCC score the winning points.

The UH reserves battled longer in the second game.
