Plans for park facilities draw comment

Funding for canoe-racing activities at Ala Wai Park, assistance for Laotian refugees and expanded facilities for ballroom dancers were supported during a City Council public hearing on the 1984-85 budget bills last night.

The Kapiolani Park Master Plan was another subject up for discussion last night, and the council got the full range of complaints against moving the Kalakaua Avenue tennis courts and tearing down Queen's Surf Pavilion. The council, however, put off action on a resolution requiring the Parks and Recreation Department to keep the tennis courts at their present location.

More than a dozen speakers showed up to testify on Mayor Eileen Anderson's \$393 million operating budget and \$75 million construction budget, many focusing their attention on specific items.

For instance, at least four persons representing different canoe clubs on the island spoke in favor of Councilman Leigh Wai-Doo's proposal for \$40,000 in the budget as a first step toward building a canoe shelter, storage area, bleachers and ramps at Ala Wai Park. Henry Ayau, head coach of the Outrigger Canoe Club, said there are 5,000 paddlers on Oahu, and new facilities

are needed at the park, which is a primary practice area for the clubs. But Gardner Brown of Na Opio Canoe Club said the funding seems to be piecemeal because the estimated cost of the shelter alone would be about \$150,000.

Ballroom dancers also use Ala Wai Park, and Arthur Forcier, president of the International Ballroom Dancers Club, suggested that the city do something about the clubhouse where the dancers meet. Forcier said the clubhouse is badly in need of repair, and that the dancers should get some funding to expand the facilities.

Sengdao Rattanasamay, who recently won a Jefferson Award in recognition of his work in trying to ease the transition of Laotian refugees in Hawaii, urged the council to consider including in the budget assistance for Laotian refugees. Rattanasamay said that of the 2,000 refugees here, 75 percent live in low-income housing, and

many are victims of crimes that go unreported because they cannot speak English. He supported Prosecutor Charles Marsland's request to hire a bilingual Laotian to assist in criminal cases.

Virginia Kepano, representing Kokua Council, a senior citizens' organization, opposed the city administration's plan to raise bus fares from 50 cents to 75 cents. The increase, she said, would only encourage people to drive their cars instead.

"Kokua Council believes anything that induces people to ride the buses is to the benefit of the general public," she said.

As an alternative to raising bus fares, Council Chairwoman Patsy Mink is making such proposals as doubling downtown parking rates. Albert Sing said he supported that idea and so did Joseph DeMatto, who said that even with the increases, the cost would be less than parking in private facilities.

But Chester Kunitake, contracts officer for the Hawaii Government Employees Association, said he's concerned about the effect a rate boost would have on city workers who park in city lots. Kunitake said the amount of the increase is unreasonable in light of the pay increases negotiated for city employees. Half of the pay increase for lower-paid employees would be wiped out by the hike in parking rates, he said.

The Kapiolani Park plan has already gone through a series of public hearings held by the Parks and Recreation Department. Last night, the council got to hear what the public thinks about the master plan for the park.

Tennis players said they're against moving the Kalakaua Avenue tennis courts. But Tamotsu Tanaka of the Kapahulu Community Association said removing the courts would allow beach users to get street parking on Kalakaua Avenue. Tanaka suggested the city consider having private concessionaires operate a baseball batting cage and skating rink in the park for youngsters.

Planner William Wanket said he's dismayed by provisions in the plan to eliminate the parking lot at Queen's Surf and tear down the pavilion there. Wanket questioned the plan's use of angle parking on Kalakaua Avenue, which he believes will prove to be hazardous.

Na Kamahao of Hilo defeated the Outrigger Golden Masters, 14-16, 15-12, 13-4, to win the men's master's division. Lanikai finished third.

Haili slam play starts tomorrow

A record field of 97 teams, all from Hawaii, are entered in the 26th annual Haili Men's Club's Easter Volleyball Tournament which starts tomorrow and runs through Saturday at Afook-Chinen Civic Auditorium.

Competition for Hilo area teams only will run tomorrow and Tuesday, with Honolulu women's novice teams slated to debut Wednesday night.

Tommy Lindsey, president of the Haili Men's Club, is general

chairman of the six-day double elimination tourney. His two daughters, Lyndell Lindsey and Enola Gay "Sweetie" Osorio are serving as tournament coordinators.

The field includes teams in the women's novice and open divisions, men's novice and open divisions, and, for the first time, a masters men's division.

All matches the first three days will be in novice play. Matches in

the open and masters divisions will start Thursday, when tournament action is spread out with matches at the civic, UHH Athletic Complex, Pihoonua Gym and Hilo Armory.

Matches held at the civic tomorrow through Wednesday will begin at 5 p.m. Competition Thursday through Saturday starts at 8 a.m. each day.

All matches Saturday will take place at the civic.

"The entire field this year is made up of teams from Hawaii," said Pat Engelhard, publicity chairman. "Teams are coming from Kauai, Oahu, Molokai and Maui to join our own local teams. The competition should be great."

Engelhard said TV star Tom Selleck of "Magnum PI," is listed on the roster of the OCC Masters open division team. It is unknown, however, whether

Selleck will be here for the tournament.

All teams entered in the tournament pay only a nominal entry fee and the matches are open to the public at no charge. In addition, all of the players are guests at a post tournament luau at the conclusion of play Saturday.

"We have no pre-tourney favorites this year," said Engelhard. "The competition should be great in all divisions."
