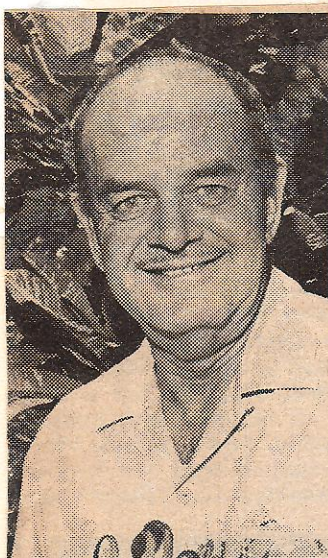

# Islanders float home on summer school

Two Island boys returned home during the weekend... and each brought his summer school with him.

Midshipman 1.C. Anthony "Tony" Turbeville, 21, of Oahu, arrived in USS England and Midshipman 3.C. Rodney "Mat" Matsushima, 19, of Maui, in USS Turner Joy.

The ships are part of Cruiser-Destroyer Flotilla Seven, commanded by Rear Adm. Lloyd R. Vasey, that arrived at Pearl Harbor on Saturday for a six-day visit.

FLOTILLA flagship is the USS New Jersey, the only active battleship in the world. She is commanded by Capt. J. Edward Snyder Jr.

Aboard are 413 U.S. Naval Academy and Naval ROTC midshipmen who are receiving extensive training in ship operations during their eight-week Pacific cruise.

Tony, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis E. Turbeville, of 84-040 Lawaia St., Waianae, has completed three years at the University of Kansas.

A HISTORY major, he will graduate with an arts degree and become an ensign in the regular Navy, making the job as a surface-line officer his goal.

"I'm not sure when I decided to join the Navy," he says, "but it is a fantastic opportunity."

Tony graduated from Waianae High School in 1966 and is the first student from that school to be awarded a Naval ROTC scholarship.

HE WAS born in Oakland, Calif., coming to the Islands with his parents in September, 1958. "That makes me more than half a kamaaina," he says.

Mat Matsushima ("They call me Mat because they can't pronounce my last name") is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Haruo Matsushima, of 166 Shaw St., Lahaina.

He graduated from Lahainaluna High School in 1967

and went on to Purdue University where he is majoring in biology and chemistry.

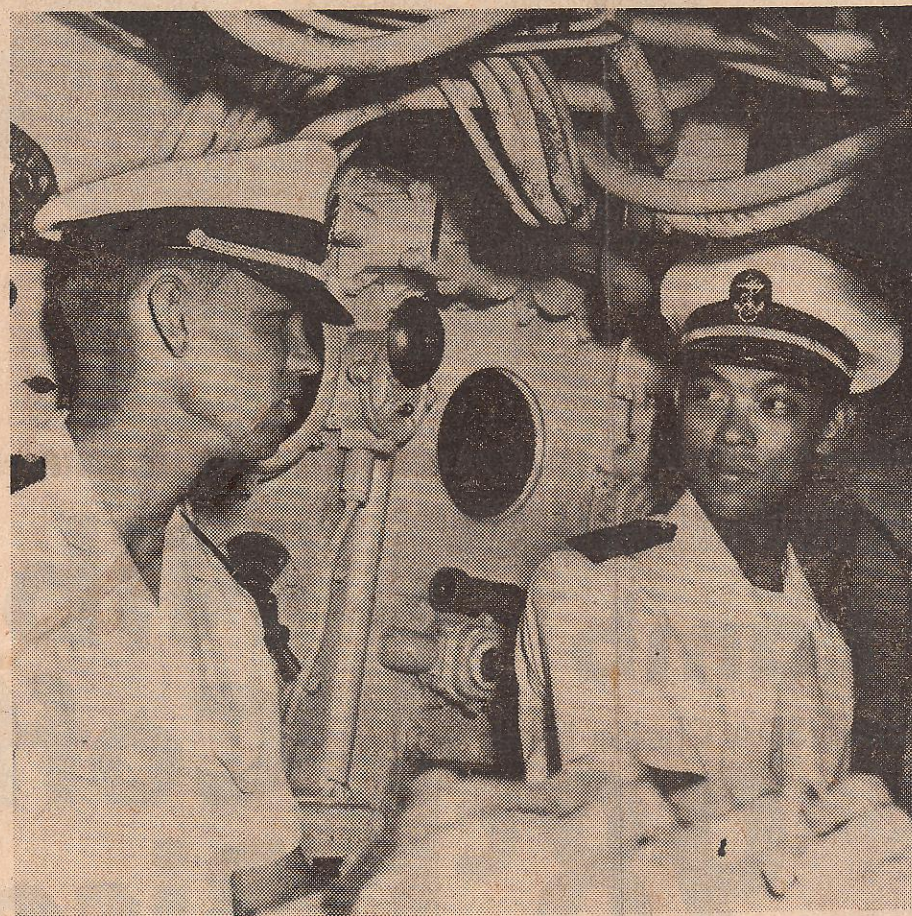
BECAUSE of his excellent grades and on the recommendation of his professors he was given the opportunity

to enroll in the Naval ROTC program.

"It's a wonderful program," he says. "The tuition alone is worth \$1,700 a year at Purdue. But I'm still undecided about a Navy career."

Both midshipmen were visibly impressed during a brief tour of the New Jersey, especially stops at the No. 1 gun turret and the wheelhouse.

BUT WHAT really caught their fancy were the "swimming pools" on both port and starboard sides just forward of the five-inch gun mounts. The pools are actually cut-down steel tubs that used to house 40mm anti-aircraft guns that were removed

when the battlewagon was reactivated in April, 1968.

"As far as I know the captain is the only one who has ever had a swim in one of them," a guide explained, "and that was only for picture-taking purposes."

INCLUDED in the flotilla are the guided missile destroyers USS Somers, Decatur, John Paul Jones, Parsons, and the guided missile frigate England, which is nearly the size of a light cruiser.

Other ships are the general purpose destroyers USS Brinkley Bass, Turner Joy, McKean, Morton, Isbell, Pickens, Porterfield, Fichteler and Preston.

The middies aboard, from the academy and 36 colleges and universities, will receive training in shiphandling, gunnery, communications and engineering as well as anti-submarine and anti-aircraft warfare.

WHILE HERE, they will also get training at the Marine Corps' Puuloa rifle range near Ewa Beach and attend briefings and special demonstrations.

A tea dance was held yesterday at the Pearl Harbor Officers' Club and an informal beach party is to be held at the Outrigger Canoe Club.

Vasey and Snyder will host about 130 Oahu military and civic leaders at a reception aboard the New Jersey on Thursday.
