

## Super Tennis moves tournament to Oahu

The Seiko Super Tennis Tournament of Hawaii will move to the Blaisdell Arena this fall.

The tournament, which offers \$117,000 in prize money, was moved from Maui to Honolulu "to provide more people the opportunity to

enjoy worldclass tennis," said Susume Ota, a Hattori Seiko Co. representa-

tive from Japan. The Super Tennis event, a Volvo Grand Prix tournament, has been held annually on Maui since 1974, except for the inaugural year when the last two nights of competition were staged at McKinley High gym on Oahu.

This year's tournament will be held from Sept. 24-30, with a 32-player draw in singles and 16 teams in doubles. A qualifying tournament is scheduled for Sept. 22-23 to fill four open berths among the 32 singles players.

The singles champion will receive \$20,000 and the runner-up \$10,000. The doubles champions will split \$6,000.
