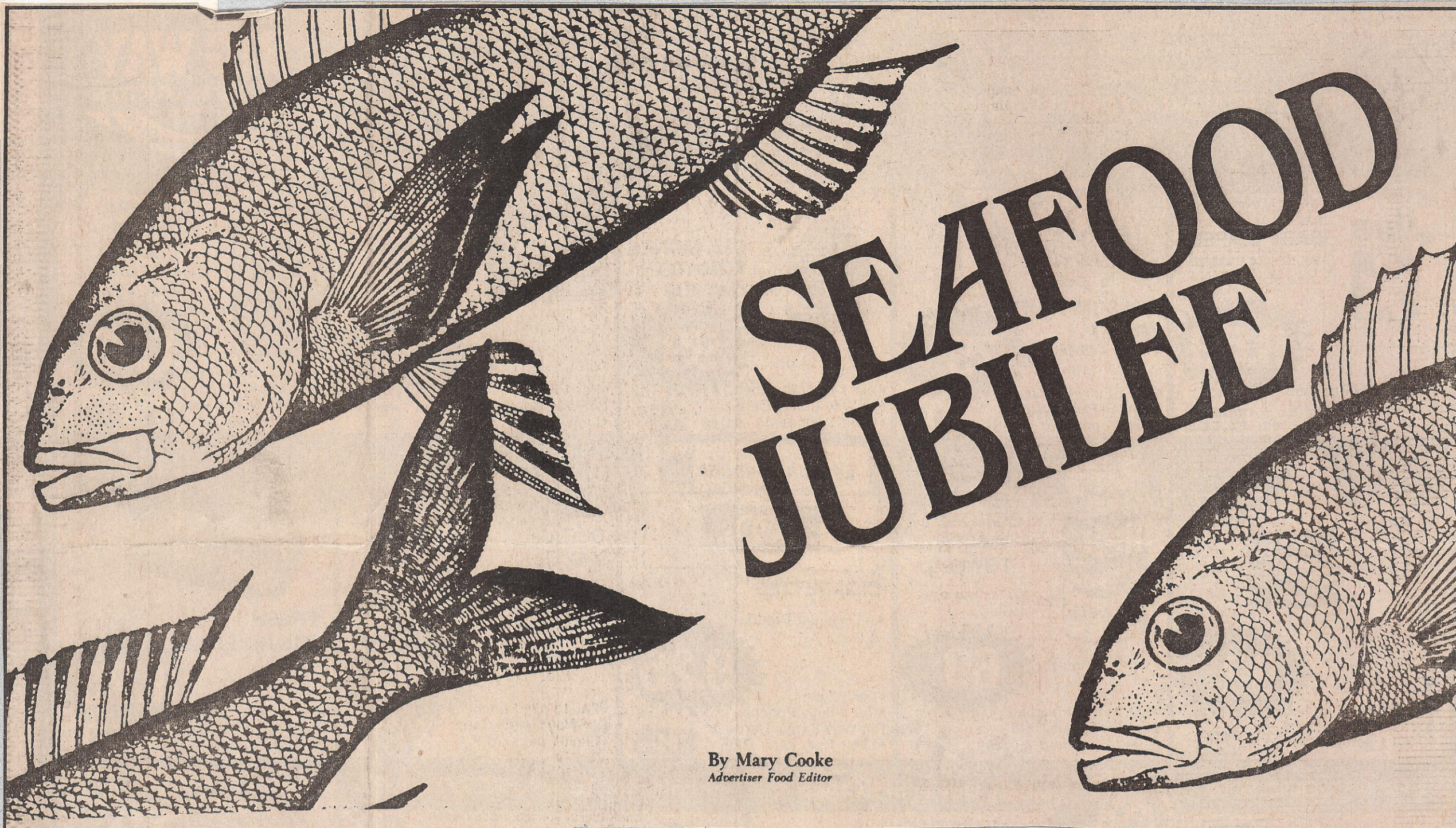

Be there on Sunday, 4 to 8 p.m. in the Hawaiian Ballroom of the Hawaiian Regent Hotel, if you're ready to eat your way through mountains of sashimi, Oysters Rockefeller, crab, lobster, shrimp, squid, scallops, octopus, mussels, baked fish, fried fish, fish chowder, fish salad and hors d'oeuvres — all specialties of fine Honolulu restaurants, caterers and hotel dining rooms.

UH, OCC Teams Win Isle Spikers Still Perfect

SEATTLE—It served UCLA right for trying to avenge the loss last December in the NCAA Finals to the University of Hawaii Wahines volleyball team.

The seven Wahine seniors—with some help from Kentucky star Marsha Bond—used 12 straight serves by Marcie Wurts in the second game to hand Westwood (a.k.a. UCLA) a 7-15, 15-13, 15-7 defeat yesterday and keep the Rainbow Wahines perfect in the second round of pool play at the U.S. Volleyball Association's national championships.

The Wahines went into this morning's final pool game against the University of Wyoming with a 2-0 mark, also having defeated Texas Magic, with Hawaii's Lindy Vivas, 15-7, 15-6.

In men's open competition, Outrigger Canoe Club Open stayed unbeaten with wins over two Southern California teams. OCC defeated ISA, 15-10, 15-7, and Raymond Construction, 15-5, 15-8. The Hawaii team finishes out pool play against Mac Club of Portland, Ore.

Play in the men's Masters and Golden Masters divisions got under way yesterday with two-time defending champ OCC Masters winning both its matches and the Golden Masters taking three of four sets off its two opponents. Scores were unavailable from those matches.

IN THE WAHINES' GAME against Westwood, the Bruins held a 13-3 lead in the

second set before Wurts went back to serve. With Kori Pulaski spiking, setter Joyce Kaapuni running the offense and Bond and Deitre Collins clogging the middle, the Wahines rallied for 12 unanswered points behind Wurts' consistent serves. The rally deflated Westwood and the Wahines had little trouble winning the third set for the match.

"We haven't had much time to practice or work with Marsha Bond," said UH assistant coach Dean Nowack. "Kori's been the glue that holds the team together and Joyce has been running her usual beautiful game. Deitre and Marsha are finally coming together in the middle but it's going to be real tough to go all the way."

The Wahines were one of four remaining unbeaten teams going into this morning's pool play at the University of Washington. The others were Cascade Steelers, Carlson Chrysler and Gator Aders. OCC Open, which got tremendous efforts from Mark Rigg and Jay Andersen, were among six undefeated squads. Also holding perfect marks were defending champ Nautilus Pacific, Mizuno, Athletic Attack, Texas Stars and Baden of Seattle.

After this morning's pool play, the top two teams from each of the four pools were to advance to a double-elimination round. Semifinals are scheduled for tomorrow with finals Saturday at UW's Hec Edmundson Pavilion.

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Super Tennis moves tournament to Oahu

The Seiko Super Tennis Tournament of Hawaii will move to the Blaisdell Arena this fall.

The tournament, which offers \$117,000 in prize money, was moved from Maui to Honolulu "to provide more people the opportunity to enjoy world-class tennis," said Susume Ota, a Hattori Seiko Co. representative from Japan.

The Super Tennis event, a Volvo Grand Prix tournament, has been held annually on Maui since 1974, except for the inaugural year when the last two nights of competition were staged at McKinley High gym on Oahu.

This year's tournament will be held from Sept. 24-30, with a 32-player draw in singles and 16 teams in doubles. A qualifying tournament is scheduled for Sept. 22-23 to fill four open berths among the 32 singles players.

The singles champion will receive \$20,000 and the runner-up \$10,000. The doubles champions will split \$6,000.

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Wahines lose, OCC triumphs

SEATTLE — The University of Hawaii Rainbow Wahines lost in the opening round of the double-elimination finals in the United States Volleyball Association national tournament yesterday.

The Wahines, seeded third in the eight-team finals, were defeated by sixth-seeded UCLA, 15-7, 15-3, and will play Merrill Lynch of Arizona today. UH reached the final round with a 15-4, 15-4 victory over Wyoming in its final match of pool play yesterday.

The Outrigger men's open team won its first match of the double-elimination finals, defeating Athletic Attic, 15-12, 15-4. Today, OCC will play Riunite, a team consisting of ex-UCLA players. OCC advanced with a 15-1, 15-2 victory earlier in the day.

The Outrigger masters (35-and-over) and golden masters (45-and-over) teams also won and are in the finals of their respective divisions. Scores of yesterday's matches were not available.
