Depth Pays Off for Host Club

OCC Outclasses Macfarlane Field

Outrigger Canoe Club is a lousy host. Not only did OCC invite its friends to yesterday's Walter J. Macfarlane Day Canoe Regatta on a crowded and festive Waikiki Beach, but when the party was over the host paddled home with most of the honors.

"We sponsored the Macfarlane Regatta so naturally we wanted to win it. It's one of three races that we peak for," explained Donny Mailer, Outrigger's coaching coordinator. OCC upset previously unbeaten Hui Nalu, 77-53, while Healan, with 42 points, placed a distant third. It was Outrigger's seventh Macfarlane win in 11 years.

In snapping Hui Nalu's win streak at five, Outrigger flexed its awesome depth for the first time this season. In 27 events, Outrigger won seven races; placed second in six heats and came in third in five events. "We started the season slowly and it appears that we've just now begun to roll," Mailer added.

With Outrigger and Hui Nalu dominating the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association in recent seasons, competition for first place has become a battle between two giants. But what of the smaller clubs? "Our competitors laugh when we launch our old fiberglass canoe," Gloria Kelihoomalu, president of Wa-

anae's Ohana O Ke Kai Canoe Club, explained. "But you should see our other canoe. It's in worse condition yet."

WHILE HUI NALU BOASTS an armada of eight fiberglass and three koa canoes, while fielding crews in almost every event, Ohana O Ke Kai competes with two borrowed fiberglass canoes, plus a koa boat, which fails to meet racing specifications.

"What our club lacks in equipment, we try to make up for in enthusiasm," Kelihoomalu added. But enthusiasm has its limits. In yesterday's competition, Ohana O Ke Kai's Boys 12-year "B" crew placed first but that was the end of the club's scoring. Three other crews of the fledgling Leeward Oahu club came in last in their respective events. "What I'd give for a top racing canoe, plus other good canoes to be used for practice," Kelihoomalu said.

With an incoming tide which reduced the already narrow strip of sandy beach to a sliver, and a holiday crowd of sun-drenched canoe paddlers, spectators and tourists which turned out in masses, Waikiki Beach became a mob scene. Even the water churned as surfers, swimmers and frolicking children on boogie and belly boards competed with the canoe paddlers for surfing waves.

OUTRIGGER MAY HAVE won the Macfar-

lane team prize, but Hui Nalu topped the blue ribbon four-mile senior men's race. "It was a close race, that is until the last mile when we (Hui Nalu) caught a wave that they (Outrigger) didn't," recalled Myron Thompson, the winning steersman.

Hui Nalu turned the rough-water course in 32 minutes and one second, topping Outrigger by a comfortable 1:45. A game Waikiki Surf Club crew paddled their patched-up koa canoe Malla to a third. In team scoring, Outrigger led the regatta from the early stages and remained in the lead to the finish. The host club was never seriously threatened.

TO MAKE THE HOLIDAY setting more festive and later somewhat frenzied, beer drinking on the public beach was prevalent and the law prohibiting drinking was ignored by nearly everyone. Yesterday's Macfarlane Regatta was indeed a spirited occasion.

"If they (canoe paddlers) can drink beer on a public beach why can't I?" questioned an obviously thirsty Molly Craig from Canada. But nobody, from the regatta's director to the president of one of Oahu's largest canoe clubs, could provide Craig with an answer. Or for that matter, even cared to. Although in direct violation of the law, drinking on Waikiki Beach was an unfortunate part of yesterday's regatta scene.

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Outrigger canoes fastest at regatta

The Outrigger Canoe Club won five events yesterday en route to winning its own Walter J. Macfarlane Regatta off Waikiki Beach.

Outrigger racked up 70 points — the highest team total this season — in winning its first regatta of the year. The Hui Nalu Canoe Club, which won the last five Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association regattas, finished second with 58 points. The Healan Canoe Club was third with 42.

The Outrigger women's senior team, which won its event last week to give OCC a short-lived lead at the Pop Waialeale Regatta, also won yesterday.

The Macfarlane Regatta has been an annual event since 1943.

In the Hui Wa'a and Surfing Association regatta at Kailua Beach, the Loa'a Cafe Club scored 58 points yesterday to win the Kamehameha Regatta. It was the fifth win in as many regattas this year for Loa'a.

The Kaneohe Canoe Club scored 47 points to narrowly beat out the Waikiki Beach Boys for second place. The Waikiki crews had 45 points.
