WITH the most cosmopolitan membership of the four private golf clubs, Mid-Pacific Country Club is proud of its "local boy" image as well as the wide range of incomes and the diversity of jobs represented on its roster. The club is located between Kailua and Lanikai.

More than half of the members commute from homes in Honolulu the windward side for their weekly golf games, and the club has an active social program of linner dances and banquets.

The initiation fee for a golfing member is \$4,000 with a proprietary interest of \$900 which is refurned at his death or resignation Monthly dues are \$65, plus a \$25 surcharge that must be spent in he restaurant operation rather than at the pro shop.

In addition to the golf course. the club has a tennis court which is currently in need of some work and a swimming pool that is temporarily closed while the board of directors considers either repairing or rebuilding it.

The clubhouse is very expenive, the golf course is improving with age, and if Salt Lake is half the size it used to be to accommodate the club, the area is a lot

greener than it was. Regular golfing memberships, now \$9,000, will be raised to \$10.-500 Sept. 1 and to \$12,000 Dec. 1. At the resignation or death of a member, there is a minimum refund of \$2,000, depending upon his ength of membership. Monthly dues are \$75.

Along with the golf course, Honolulu International has four tennis courts, all with night lights, and a swimming pool.

The dining room is open for breakfast and lunch daily and for dinner Tuesday through Saturday. There are four private dining ooms and a bar. Evening activities include disco

lessons, dances and tournament banquets. There are children's activities at the pool area during the summer and a junior golf program. It is the only club to offer a course in beginner's golf for nongolfing wives of members. Membership is open to both

men and women, and a spouse has all privileges of membership, including the right to play golf at any time with a small greens fee. There is no waiting list, and myone who wants to join has only to request an application, fill it in and send it to the membership committee. Its members tend to be young and trendy, strong for physical fitness and a good time or older athletes who confine their activities to the bar and dining

Because of the reciprocal privileges with a large number of good clubs in big cities, the Outrigger is also supported by vacationing Mainlanders, distinguished by sunburns, making themselves at

The initiation fee is \$2,000 and monthly dues are \$35. The club's major amenity is the beach and the ocean activities it offers. The Outrigger has a volleyball court, a weight room and teams in a dozen sports. Kapiolani Park across the street provides space for marathon training, mountain ball and tennis.

The dining room, reputed to serve the best club food in town. is open for lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday and a simple lunch is served Mondays on the hau terrace.

There are seven or eight major club parties a year, and a summer athletic program for members' children that focuses on water sports-swimming, surfing

and canoeing. Membership is open to men and women who have been residents of Hawaii for at least one year prior to applying. There it a waiting list, although the Outrigger remains the least racially integrated of the clubs listed here

#### The Plaza Club

DUE to open in June, the Plaza Club is located on the 20th and 21st floors of Pioneer Plaza in downtown Honolulu where it has a panoramic view of Honolulu harbor, the ocean and the mountains. It is a luncheon and dining club, with no other facilities, and is designed to appeal to the downtown businessman or woman. The management promises superb food in an elegant setting.

The initiation fee is now \$600 for a resident charter membership. and dues are \$40 per month. For those with the long range view, there's a \$3,600 life membership and you never have to pay any

The club will have a dining room, a lounge, a bar, a grill room and three private dining rooms. It will be open for lunch Monday through Friday and for dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Wine tastings, backgammon lessons. Las Vegas nights and international dinners are planned for the membership. There will be live music and dancing nightly.

The Plaza Club is operated by the Club Corporation of America and has reciprocal privileges with others in the group. There are 81 of them all over the country, but you may never have heard of them. The Atrium Club is in New York and the Spring Valley Count-

try Club is in Victorville, Calif. Membership is open to men and women, and the spouse of a member enjoys the full privileges of the club. There is no waiting list, but Gerald Kremkow, chairman of the board, said that he expects one after the club opens.

A prospective member must be sponsored by an active member who presents his name to the admissions committee. It is not necessary for him to meet the committee, which decides upon accepting or rejecting him after

its own investigation. Anyone who has been invited to join the club to this point has already been approved by the board of directors who supervised the preparation of the invitation list.

The club will not have a president, but developer Sheridan Ing and attorney C. Frederick Schutte form the executive committee with Kremkow.
