

OCC Outduels Rival Hui Nalu

"I'm happy that we won but the scoring was far too close for comfort," sighed Nat Norfleet, coach of the victorious Outrigger Canoe Club team in yesterday's King Kamehameha Regatta at Kailua

"We still have a few gaps to fill in our crews but the youngsters came through for us. We'll be at full strength in a couple of weeks and then watch out.

Outrigger CC edged Hui Nalu Canoe Club by a scant two points to further fuel the canoe paddling rivalry that seems to grow with each meet.

"Outrigger entered and placed high in just enough events to win," said one confident OCC boaster rather smugly. "We won last week at Waimanalo, and we plan to win next week at Nanakuli. It's a matter of putting your power where

Both Outrigger and Hui Nalu canoe clubs failed to to field crews in 10 of the 24 events, but both scored high in the remaining races to paddle off with the regatta's two top places.

The wind was blustery and the seas were choppy making canoe paddling difficult, but the warm Hawaiian sun brought out the spectators by the thousands. Kailua Park yesterday, looked like a Windward Oahu Waikiki Beach.

COMPETITION WAS INTENSE in the Men's Open-four event. "I looked over at the Hui Nalu crew and they resembled Outrigger East," remarked Bruce Ames, Outrigger Canoe Club's winning steersman. "Two of the four Hui Nalu key crewmen-steersman Fred Hemmings and stroker Brant Ackerman-are former Outrigger paddlers. Beating them today meant something

OCC's four-man team consisted of Tom Conner, Tim Kelly John Finney and Ames.

However, in the men's senior race-considered by many to be the regatta's blue ribbon event-OCC failed to field a team and left the winning to

rival Hui Nalu. 'I'm disappointed that Outrigger didn't see fit to enter." said Myron Thompson, the Hui Nalu steersman. "I feel confident that we could have beaten them today. Perhaps they (OCC) will give us that opportunity later in the season.'

A minor collision, a least four swampings, several false starts, a disqualification, or two, plus many uncontrolled sailboats romping through the race course added excitement to the

day-long regatta. The meet's closest racing came in the women's master event when Outrigger Canoe Club nipped Kailua Canoe Club by less than one second. Waikiki Surf Club topped the women's senior event. (Results in Scoreboard, Page C-4).

Outrigger compiled 54 points to outdistance second-place finisher Waikiki Surf Club by nine points. Waikiki Surf, which wound up fifth last week, garnered 45 points. Hui Nalu, in second-place last week, dropped a notch to third this week with 42 points.

Crabb to coach isle in PacRim

Tony Crabb, a former all-American and professional volleyball player with a long list of coaching successes, has been chosen to lead the Big Isle boys' team into this summer's Pacific Rim International Junior Volleyball Championships.

And, Crabb said, one of his main concerns now is to assemble as much local talent as possible, keeping Big Island standouts here rather than losing them to the Honolulu team he has coached since 1974.

Crabb will kick off his quest for a Big Isle PacRim title with a meeting for all prospective candidates Tuesday at 7 p.m. at the MPR room at Haili Church. All boys aged 20 and under are eligible.

Crabb's appointment was announced this week by Lyndell Lindsey of the tournament committee. He brings some 17 years of experience as a volleyball player and coach, a career that dates back to his prep days at Punahou in 1962.

Crabb went on from Punahou to play for University of Oregon and was a member of Outrigger Canoe Club's 1967 and 1975 National AAU champion squads. In 1968, he was named a collegiate all-American at Church College (now BYU-Hawaii) and was selected as an alternate to the U.S. Olympic team the same

He made the U.S. national men's team in 1970, was an alternate to the U.S. team at the 1971 Pan American Games and was again an all-American choice in 1975 as a member of the Outrigger national championship

In 1975 he joined the professional ranks and played for the Southern California Bangers.

Crabb launched his coaching career in 1968 with the Church College junior varsity and headed the Kailua High School program from 1969 until 1972. In 1973, he hed Kamehameha Schools to second place in the state and has coached the Hawaii All-Stars in the PacRim since 1974. His 1977 Outrigger 18-under team finished third in the nation and he was chosen to the U.S. Olympic staff in 1978.

Outrigger takes HCRA regatta

Defending HCRA state champion marked at 2:49.1. Outrigger proved itself the team to beat once again yesterday - edging rival Hui Nalu in the Hawaii Canoe Racing Association's King Diana Poteet. Lanikai was a distant Kamehameha Regatta at Kailua

Nearly 2,000 spectators, family and friends watched in the warmth of the sun while the paddlers braved wind and choppy waters in the third meeting of the HCRA season.

Summer may be still be in its infant stages but the Outrigger-Hui Nalu rivalry is a vintage one. Outrigger edged Hui Nalu for the state championship by one point last July while Hui Nalu was the victor in the association's Oahu finals.

Outrigger won six events yesterday, netting 48 total points to Hui Nalu's 46. Lanikai was right behind to collect third place with 45 points.

The race of the day - the senior men's two-miler - was Hui Nalu's feather in the cap. With no Outrigger team to contest in the last event of the long day, Hui Nalu looked to Lanikai for its competition, but found it was Hui Lanakila that offered the threat.

Kala Kukea's Hui Nalu team clocked a 17:47.5 first place, edging Hui Lanakila's 18:13.0. Third place went to Kailua, with a 18:38.2 finish and Lanikai pulled in fourth at 18:42.6, despite a healthy lead at

"We usually worry about Lanikai, but Lanakila worried us today," said coach and third-seat paddler Kukea. The crew was hungry to win after losing last week.

Lanikai took the HCRA two-mile at Waimanalo last week, although the earlier Honolulu contest went to Hui Nalu. Kukea said his veteran crew is

facing competition that's turning the long race into a "two-mile sprint you just can't let up.' Waikiki Surf took one of its three

wins in the senior women's mile, finishing in 10:29.3, only 10 seconds before Hui Nalu crossed the line. Outrigger was third in 10:50.3. The Waikiki team, said paddler Cindy Kalama, concentrated on,

"not so much speed but lots of pull."

Waikiki pushed ahead early and held

its lead through the halfway mark and into the finish. Waimanalo entered only one race. the mixed men's and women's open, but managed to win it. The team of Haunani Kepa, Mary Paaoao. Soloman Perry, Linda Ramos, John Bowes and Elizabeth Puaoi clocked a 4:44.0 half-mile, topping Hui

Nalu's 4:52.8. Two crews of women masters pulled in bow to bow, but the .6 of-asecond edge went to Outrigger, with a 2:48.5 quarter-mile. Kailua was

'Well, we would have preferred a first, but it wasn't like we were left far behind," said Kailua paddler

There was some discussion but no formal protest early in the day when the Outrigger and Kailua teams were disqualified for false starts in the 18-year-old boys mile.

While officials ruled that the canoe bows had crossed the starting line. Outrigger coach Walter Guild argued that some individual lane flags were well ahead of the official line, which he said was difficult to determine from the water. He said his team had kept the bow behind the individual lane flag.

Outrigger's sophomore men marked a distinct first and remained undefeated in their mile race, finishing more than 30 seconds ahead of Kailua with a 8:56.6. Kailua timed a 9:29.5 finish.


Sophomore men are our best crew," said Outrigger coach Nat Norfleet. "They're our point getters, I can always count on five points from them." he said
