Insanity in Sweats

If the slumbering residents of Kaaawa have their sleep disturbed by an earth tremor before dawn Sunday they need not be alarmed.

Nor should they pass off the patter of rushing feet and the wheezing of bronchial tubes as only neighbor DJ Sam Sanford loping after the Kaaawa garbage truck.

It will be nothing more than one stretch of 140 miles of fun and games called insanity in sweats.

The second annual Oahu Perimeter Relay race has drawn eight teams to the post. That's 56 runners who haven't been told Cupid is on the prowl.

Each team is made up of seven men will run distances the captain deems best. A slide rule calculation rounds that out to 20 miles per runner.

The race begins and ends at Kalakaua and Monsarrat across from the Honolulu Zoo. The course is counter-clockwise, or Diamond Head-Koko Head-Kahuku-Kaena Point.

A joint military team running under a Camp Smith banner established a record of 15 hours last year.

But if Ed Romary, executive-secretary of Mid-Pacific Road Runners, has good foresight that mark will tumble.

"Windward Athletic Club should be ruled the race favorite. They are headed by the sensational young runner Kurt Mench who did so well in our last 40-mile short loop race," Romary said.

Other Entries

Also competing are teams from Barbers Point Naval Air Station, Camp Smith Marines, Armed Forces YMCA, Kapiolani Runners, Kailua High School, Tantalus Marathoners and KGMB.

The runners of Outrigger Canoe Club have decided to sit this Valentine Day race out and train toward next year.

The MPRRC has split its members due to a ruling that doesn't allow Road Runners Club of America to compete as a body.

Kapiolani Runners and Tantalus have absorbed most of these top runners.

Scott Hamilton will be Tantalus' big gun.

This Hamilton runs up Pike's Peak for exercise!

Karl Romano, Hawaii AAU 3-mile champ, will anchor the Kapiolani Runners. And Mike Gregorie, holder of most distance wins last year gives Barbers Point kick in the stretch.

Strategy could win the race. Knowing what to expect from a man after he has already done 10 miles could prove vital.

"The better clubs will run longer legs," Romary predicts.

"Nobody is giving away any race strategy, but a good guess would be four-mile legs for most of the race.

"This allows the runner to have enough to come back after a fairly decent rest.

"But we kid nobody—all runners can expect a night and day of pain."

But all battle strategy will be thrown to the winds if two or more clubs get locked in a tight race.

"If a lead is threatened you can bet a fresh man will be employed in an attempt to keep it," Romary said.

Biggest Mystery

The KGMB team is the biggest mystery. Even weatherman Bill Edwards has been excluded from top-level pre-race conferences and knows only that Earl McDaniels initiated the junket.

Al Allen is expected to give a pant-by-pant account of the race over KGMB radio—unless he's on the team.

The race is co-sponsored by the City and County Parks and Recreation and MPRRC. Trophies will be awarded.

It all begins at 10 P.M. Saturday.
