Chart House beats AF, gains volleyball final

The Chart House team of San Diego, Calif., moved into the finals of the National Volleyball Championship Tournament last night by taking the measure of the United States Armed Forces, 15-6, 15-10.

Long Beach gained the winners' bracket finals of the Senior Open Men's Division by taking the measure of Balboa Bay Club, 9-6, 12-15, 15-9, at the McKinley

gymnasium.

Earlier, Long Beach had beaten Outrigger Canoe Club, 15-7, 5-14, and 12-7.

In the second semifinal match of the men's open division, Balboa downed Ciscos, 14-8, 9-13, 15-10. Balboa plays Chart House this morning at 11:45 at Klum gymnasium.

In the women's division winners' bracket match at Klum gymnasium, the Los Angeles Shamrocks moved into the finals by downing

Windjammers No. 1, 12-9, 14-10.

In another women's bracket semifinal match, the Los Angeles Renegade Greens defeated Nuuanu Y, 13-8, 16-18, 13-9.

With Colleen Boyd, Sharon McAlexander, Elinor Barbour and Bev Miller spiking invincibly, the Renegades were unbeatable.

For Nuuanu Y, Cindy Kallama, Fanny Hopeau, Sharon Peterson and Jay Akeo played outstandingly.

Today the finals and semis

in all divisions will be held at the Honolulu International Center Arena, with the first match going on at 12:30.

With Toshi Toyoda and Dan Patterson forming a brilliant feeder-spiker combination, the Chart House played invincibly and looms as the team to beat for the championship.

SO FAR in the tournament, the Chart House slammers have won eight straight sets without a loss. Last night's victory was its fourth

in a row.

In the first set, Chart House established an early lead and at 1:09, led 11-4. After the Armed Forces team took two points, Chart House won the next four points with Toyoda coming through with the winning point on a spike.

The second set saw the Armed Forces lead 3-0 and 4-1, but Chart House roared back to annex five successive points. The score was then tied at 7-7. Thereafter it was all Chart House.

Besides Toyoda and Patterson, Mike Bright, Bob Clem, Larry Rundle and R. Suwara played well for the winners.

Third round matches in the women's division saw the Nuuanu Y defeat the Windjammers No. 2, 15-8, 15-1. Also winning were the Long Beach Shamrocks, Windjammers No. 1 and the Los Angeles Renegades Green team.

Chart House, earlier in the fourth round, defeated Outrigger Canoe Club Whites, 15-8, 15-9.

The United States Armed Forces took UCLA into camp, 15-8, 15-11.

In a bitter struggle, Balboa Bay Club won over Olympic Club of San Francisco, 15-7, 6-14 and 15-3. Cisco turned back C&H Gold of Los Angeles, 15-4, 15-9.

THE WOMEN'S division saw two Hawaii teams lose in the fourth round.

Keaukaha went down in three sets before the South Bay Spoilers, 11-15, 13-5 and 15-8, while the Honolulu YBA six lost to the Dallas Independents, 10-15, 15-12, 15-1.

The Cal Hustlers and Vancouver Calonas won their matches.

IT WAS announced last night that the Japan girls team which is visiting in Honolulu will play two exhibition matches.

The Japanese will play the National Tournament All-Star Women's team at 11:30 this morning at the University of Hawaii Klum gymnasium.

Then on Monday at 7:30 p.m., the visitors will take on the National Champions at Church College of Hawaii.

Rundle most valuable as Chart House wins

San Diego's untouchable Chart House takes home this week not only the National Men's Volleyball title, but also the most valuable player trophy for one of its six top tourney players.

Larry Rundle was awarded the coveted honor for his

all-around performance in Hawaii's first national volleyball championships at Klum and McKinley gyms, and for the championship climax, at the Honolulu International Center Saturday night before 4,279 fans.

Rundle and his teammates rolled over six opponents, including Hawaii's Outrigger Canoe Club, and lost only one set, compared to 12 set victories and six match wins.

In the championship game against heftier and more powerful Balboa Bay Club, the agile and speedier Chart House dominated the match completely, taking both sets, 15-3, 15-6, with apparent ease.

In the women's bracket, Mary Jo Peppler, captain of runner-up Sul Ross College, was tabbed most valuable player. The left spiker near-

ly led her team to the national title via the loser division route by downing Long Beach, 15-7, 15-4, in the first match, but the girls from Alpine, Texas lost to the defending national champions, 4-15, in the playoffs.

In the senior men's open, Balboa Bay Club, led by coach Mike O'Hara and Chuck Nelson, pulled off the tourney's greatest comeback by upsetting Long Beach for the national trophy. After losing to Long Beach earlier in the tournament, 6-15, 9-15, and the first set, 11-15, Balboa gathered momentum and rallied to win the next two, 12-10, 15-4, to set up the winner-take-all playoff.

With Nelson and O'Hara spiking hard, Balboa continued its pace and won, 15-9, to take the senior men's title.

The Honolulu YMCA was host to the tourney, and judging from the turnout at the H.I.C. Saturday night, tournament chairman Jack Schaab says the club came out in the black, despite a \$15,000 to \$20,000 investment in the venture.

Bill Maket was tournament chairman and W. W. Robinson was a jack-of-all trades.

The Hawaii Power Boat Racing Association event will be 10 a.m. Sunday. Nearly 40 drivers will contest for prizes in six categories:

"B" hydro, "U" outboard, "FJ" class, "H" class, "SK" class and unrestricted class.

ONE OF THE drivers is a girl, Laura White.

Another girl worth watching is 14-year-old Debbie Porter, a Junior National baton twirling champion. She'll show at 4 p.m. Saturday the class she's exhibited during network halftime shows at pro football battles.

On hand Saturday afternoon at 1:30 will be TV personalities Checkers and Pogo to give away two bicycles in a drawing.

At noon and again at 6 p.m. Saturday Water ski ace Ken White and new state jumping champion, Gary Thompson, will show their techniques.

Saturday at 1:30 p.m. and Sunday at 3 p.m. parachutists will drop on the carnival.
